French pattern tumbled travertine flooring made of Red Azonia travertine was used all around the pool, on terrace and in the backyard. Nearly 400 square meters of area was covered. Split face marble mosaics, stairs made of slabs and profiles manufactured in varying sizes for different places were among the structural members used in this project.

Louisiana, a southern state of the U.S.A. which was once a French colony, has recently been witnessing an interesting project. Located in Rene Ortlieb's residence with the breeze of French colonial architecture on an 800-square meter area built on a 7-decare land, the pool and terrace area were designed with French colonial-style architecture was designed with Turkish natural stones. The owner, Ortlieb, desired to create a highly distinguished style, considering the state both in terms of space and landscaping. Planning to use natural stones for the entire pool project, Ortlieb was informed that Dilsad Meraler and Umut Utku Meraler's

United Design Stone LCC could provide support in design, and then asked the company to assume manufacturing, import and assembly, beginning from design stage of the project.

The most important criterion during creation of the design was climatic conditions of Louisiana. In this southern state of the U.S.A. where outdoor organizations are suitable for a period of around nine months, pool and outdoor events are an important part of daily life. Thus, outer spaces are as important as interiors in architectural styles. Varying elevations of surfaces were used by considering land conditions in this project.
